

European STEP survey on the recognition of student engagement in European Higher Education Institutions



This survey is intended for higher education institutions (HEIs) in the European Union (EU) Member-States and aims at studying the recognition and support mechanisms of student engagement. The purpose is to collect objective data on the institutions' policies in this matter: can students' participation to citizenship-related and solidarity activities, their involvement within their institutions and on campuses, their political and associative commitment lead to formal validation in academic careers?

The survey is part of the Erasmus + European STudent Engagement Project (European STEP) led by a consortium of seven European partners: the French students' network Animafac, the European University Foundation from Luxembourg, the Office of Student Life from Dublin City University in Ireland, the University of Cergy-Pontoise in France, the University of Valladolid in Spain, the University of Vienna in Austria and the Volunteer Centre of the University of Warsaw in Poland.

It takes approximately 30 minutes to answer. The survey will be open until March 31th 2019.

Privacy rules:

The information collected through this survey is of an institutional nature and will be communicated to the public only through statistics in the context of the study on student engagement recognition across Higher Education Institutions in the EU. The seven European partners and the associated partners¹ will have access to the row data. The data will be kept for an unlimited period of time. 
